But the Arctic is rapidly losing its ice cover, exposing more land and ice-free ocean, making it an attractive target for resource extraction and a geopolitical pawn. However, ice

and the frozen Arctic itself is a global resource that, if valued proportionately to the damag<mark>e its l</mark>oss causes would be worth tens of trillions of dollars.

Arctic governance for new resource frontiers: Seabed Mining in the Arctic

The panel is about new resource frontiers such as seabed mining and their governance (or lack of), as there will be potential impacts on Arctic ecosystems and Arctic society.

The Norwegian Parliament had 'opened' areas for seabed mining in the Norwegian continental shelf in January 2024 and was proceeding to hand out licenses, until forced to pause activities, upon pressure by a minority party. Other Arctic states take a different policy stance to seabed mining, opting for a 'precautionary pause' until environmental and other effects are properly understood. A roundtable discussion will bring in points of view of different stakeholders to the question of whether the 'marine' Arctic is 'governance' ready for these new resource frontiers.

There is a growing presence of technology in the Arctic serving, for example, communication, positioning, undersea survey as well as search and rescue, which may be of dual use. The Central Arctic Ocean (CAO) is a critical apex system that has global impact. It cools our planet and helps regulate climate systems globally and is crucial for planetary health. Already we are feeling the impact on the ocean with warming, acidification, coral bleaching and ferocious ocean storms. Yet as the ice melts, corporations are looking to short-term economic opportunities from exploitation that would cause drastic and irreparable harm. Many of the professionals who populate Arctic governance circles are international and transnational in their work experience and approach: they are not diplomats, but their work is quasi-diplomatic. To grasp the evolution of Arctic governance, we need to understand their perspectives and practices in greater detail. My argument draws primary empirical material from extensive ethnographic fieldwork at (international) Arctic governance events. The presentation advances our understanding of the spaces and agents of international governance.

Claire Mosoni (PhD student, Interdisciplinary Environmental Sciences, University of Helsinki)

Presentation's title: The EU's influence on Arctic policymaking: Implications for climate adaptation

Description: Adapting to the impacts caused by rapid Arctic warming is becoming increasingly urgent. However, policy responses remain fragmented due to the involvement of local, national and international actors, the diversity of Arctic policy sub-issues and the role of non-climatic drivers. This presentation examines the role of an international actor like the European Union, exploring how it influences Arctic policymaking and contributes to different pathways for adaptation. Our research highlights how international actors shape regional adaptation efforts and underscores the need for strategic choices and compromises to advance adaptation to climate change in a fast-changing region like the Arctic.

Anita Parlow (A.L. Parlow & Associates, LLC)

Presentation's title: Russia's hybrid war below lines of visibility - Trump's territorial ambitions in plain sight

Description: As President Trump threatens to make Canada a 51st state, annex the Panama Canal, and purchase Greenland, while simultaneously reducing support for NATO, Russian President Putin appears to have offered an endorsement of Trump's territorial ambition. At an Arctic forum in the Russian port city of Murmansk, Putin reportedly said, "As for Greenland, this is an issue that concerns two specific states and has nothing to do with us." It appears a statement that expressed both support and noninterference.

At the same time, Putin, Putin's offer of joint ventures in energy production exemplifies Putin's hybrid strategy: offering partnership underpinned by dominance and superior capabilities. As Putin secures operational leverage across the maritime Arctic, he also uses unconventional methods like information operations, cyberattacks, and economic coercion to achieve political or strategic goals – which appears to be to hollow-out Western democracies.

Chris Guillot (Co-founder of Awarenearth)

Presentation's title: Reflections on natural, anthropogenic, and emerging threats: personal experiences and the limits of holistic understanding

Description: Within the shifting geopolitical landscape and its impact on the Elements of Security, my short presentation reflects on 25 years of international engagement, navigating the spectrum of natural, anthropogenic, and emerging threats to humanity. Drawing from personal experiences across diverse security challenges—natural disasters, warfare, pandemics, climate change, and technological advancements—it addresses the impossible challenge for a holistic understanding of security, within the Arctic, but also within and outside all national jurisdictions. While the aim to reach a holistic understanding may be valuable, an alternative response could be to engage in interdisciplinary dialogue with the recognition of our individual and collective limitations of our multi-cultural and multi-social knowledges.

Adapting to Climate Change in Finnish Lapland: Dialogues on Tourism and Reindeer Herding

This session features two dialogues on climate change adaptation in Finnish Lapland, focusing on reindeer herding and tourism, followed by a 10-minute Q&A. Participants will explore the security risks of shifting weather patterns, impacting reindeer herders, reindeer, and tourists. The reindeer herding dialogue will address safety risks from extreme weather and changing conditions affecting herders and reindeer wellbeing. The tourism dialogue will examine safety challenges, such as unpredictable weather, and the need for adaptive measures to protect visitors. The session will also discuss practical solutions to enhance resilience and maintain safety in a changing climate.

Advancing Arctic Agency to Foster a Secure and Just Green Transition

The green transition is a crucial strategy for advancing emission reduction and energy independence through cost- and energy-efficient technological innovations. However, social justice issues remain unresolved, particularly for nature-based livelihood practitioners, Indigenous peoples, youth, children, the elderly, and low-income households. Vulnerable groups are disproportionately affected by climate change and geopolitical unrest, facing risks such as land use changes and economic marginalization. This session explores the intersection of social justice and human and environmental security in advancing a just green transition. It emphasizes inclusive solutions that combine sustainable development goals with the security, rights, and welfare of vulnerable populations.

Shared Sovereignties, Contested Securities, and Militarization in Sápmi

As a result of geopolitical tensions and changing security architecture, militaries and military interests now exercise strong command over political decision-making and land use planning across Sápmi and the Nordic "High North". Although militarization and various forms of military land use have potentially wide and far-reaching impacts on Sámi livelihoods, cultures and societies, so far the Nordic states have largely bypassed Sámi sovereignty and rights and disregarded their legal responsibilities to the Sámi, instead hastening decision-making and military land use justified by the discourses of security, secrecy and urgency. In this panel, we consider the challenges that the current conjuncture poses for Sámi self-determination, security and futurity, approaching the topic from the conceptual perspectives of shared sovereignty, settler vs. Indigenous time, and geographies of militarization.
